Friends, Happy Days are here again! Our Heavy Trash and Tree Waste are scheduled to resume as follows:

HEAVY TRASH

resumes: Monday, April 2, Pick-up Days: Apr 17, Jun 19, Aug 21

TREE WASTE

resumes: Thursday, March 1 Pick-up Days: Mar 20, May 15, July 17

From the Westwood Civic Club President: Paul talks trash...!

Yesterday (Feb 25), I received several e-mails saying that the heavy trash was being picked up on streets in the south side of Westwood. Hallelujah! Finally! By the end of the day, it was all gone.

If you'll remember, monthly heavy trash pick-up was suspended back in September due to the need to pick up Harvey debris. As long as FEMA is providing funds for hurricane clean up, heavy trash has to wait. FEMA money is scheduled to run out at the end of February so at the end of January, the City of Houston asked all civic clubs in the city to take a survey of addresses with heavy trash and submit it to them for pick up. This could be Harvey debris or other stuff but there would be one pickup in February before the regular service resumes in March. I submitted a list of addresses to COH twice, and finally was told that it would be picked up on Monday, February 26th. Leave it to the city to show up a day early but it's done, and we are all happy, except of course, those who didn't put things out and now have to wait to the 3rd week of the month.

Remember, the **regular schedule starts March 1**. Westwood pick up is the 3rd Tuesday of the month. Yard stuff: trees, etc. is picked up every month. (COH is following the old rules now and logs must be cut to size and bundled, bags of clipping must be in city approved bags.) Other stuff is picked up every other month: April, June, August, October, December.

If you haven't noticed, the city is working down Stella Link trimming trees and planting new crepe myrtles at some intersections. Once this is finished, it should look much better as well as make it easier to see crossing traffic. Thanks to the City of Houston!

Lastly, our new Westwood year begins on March 1st. Elections were held on February 15 and we have a new board of officers willing to work. Please send in your dues. Whether you are a home owner or a renter, your support helps us keep Westwood looking good, feeling safe and the best neighborhood in the city. Thanks for hearing me out! Paul Sobieski. (Ed: The best time to put out your trash is *before* the truck arrives. Some of our residents have been putting trash out *after* the truck has come.)

<u>About Project Brays Bayou</u>: Reduce the Risk. Rediscover the Beauty.

Designed to reduce the risk of flooding, the Brays Bayou Flood Damage Reduction Project, today known as Project Brays, is a cooperative effort between the Harris County Flood Control District (HCFCD) and the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers (Corps) that also incorporates local initiatives. Benefiting thousands of residents and businesses along Brays Bayou, Project Brays is the largest, most significant flood damage reduction initiative ever to be managed by HCFCD. Project Brays consists of more than 75 individual projects throughout the entire 31 miles of Brays Bayou. The majority of these projects are part of the federal project and primarily aimed at reducing flood risks. However, a few projects are strictly local initiatives with the purpose of enhancing environmental and recreational elements along Brays Bayou.

Project benefits:

Neighborhoods within the Cities of Bellaire, Houston, Southside Place, West University Place, Meadows Place, Missouri City and unincorporated areas of Harris County, as well as the Texas Medical Center, Rice University, University of Houston, Texas Southern University, Hermann Park and the Houston Zoo will see advantages from Project Brays.

In addition to reducing flood risks, Project Brays will also work to bring much needed greenspace and recreational amenities to the communities along Brays Bayou through local initiatives led by strategic partners. (Ed: Okay, tell me more about this.)

Encompassing more than 75 individual projects, Project Brays uses a collaborative approach with multiple techniques to address flood risks. The three major techniques being used are channel modifications, bridge modifications and the construction of regional stormwater detention basins. Each component contributes to reducing flood levels and the risk of flooding; together they form the strategy for Project Brays.

- 1) Channel Modifications As part of Project Brays, approximately 21 miles of the channel will be modified. Approximately 18 continuous miles of channel widening, beginning at the mouth of Brays and moving west to Fondren Road, will increase the amount of storm water the bayou is able to carry. Additionally, over three miles of channel deepening will be constructed, beginning at Old Westheimer Road and extending upstream to Highway 6.
- 2) Bridge Modifications In order to accommodate channel widening, Project Brays will also require modifications to approximately 30 bridges along Brays Bayou. These bridges will be replaced or modified to allow for increased flow capacity. The modifications will reduce obstructions and allow additional stormwater flow. (Ed note: I thought about this. Do you really want to be sitting on a bridge in rush hour traffic and watching a raging torrent just a few feet under your car? Sometimes water can look just plain angry.)
- 3) Stormwater Detention Basins Four storm water detention basins are being created that will hold approximately 3.5 billion gallons of storm water and cover about 900 acres when completed. A storm water detention basin is an area where excess storm water is stored or held temporarily until the water level in the adjacent channel recedes and the storm water can safely flow away. When full, detention basins often resemble lakes. When not holding storm water, detention basins are large, excavated open spaces. Some basins are designed to have a permanent water level in their bottoms, and vegetation is planted to provide habitat, as well as improved water quality.

The total debris collected so far would fill **13,439 buses**. (Okay, this one just didn't speak to me. Who puts trash in a school bus?)

Editor: Folks, I've had it with flood reporting. I feel like I'm trying to kick a field goal with a deflated football. Going to leave this subject until we get some information that is actionable, or at least *complainable*. We're still stuck in an extended recovery phase – as designated by heavy trash in front yards and the on-going repairs to flood-damaged homes. I'm so distressed by hearing the word "flood" that I've decided to remove all words beginning with "F" from my vocabulary. I appear to be saying very little these days. Who knew?

PIF is a partnership between Catholic Charities Refugee Resettlement program and Urban Harvest, a local community garden non-profit. A local church leased the organization three acres and introduced them to 14 Congolese refugee farmers. Some interesting facts:
