There are three churches located within the neighborhood: Corpus Christi Catholic Church, Grace Episcopal Church and Southwest Central Church of Christ, plus 15 businesses.

Top Gardening Tips

Gardening can be extremely enjoyable for people of all ages and different walks of life. It is amazing for curious children and adults alike to watch seeds in their garden grow and then nurture them into something much larger than the tiny original seedlings. There are many plants that take very little maintenance while others need the utmost attention. All plants though will have a much better chance of surviving and thriving if transplanted correctly into the right soil with appropriate pruning, if necessary.

Soil Rather than just putting any old soil on top of your plants, consider getting soil blends that offer both macro and micronutrients for your garden. It will help provide higher quality and a better yield production from your plant. Better yet, if you create a lot of compost in your home and have a small garden, adding two to three inches of organic matter on top will make your plants extremely happy. If you do not produce enough organic matter in the home and/or it isn't in your budget to purchase it, it is possible to find free topsoil advertisements in the local paper. Look into what type of soil is best for your plants and how often it needs to be watered.

Transplanting If you are planting from seed and later transplanting them into your garden, there are a few things that should be done in preparation. First, make sure the soil you have chosen in the bed is loosened at least a shovel length deep and a good amount of organic matter is thoroughly mixed in. Next, check the moisture level and determine if it is too dry or wet and adjust accordingly. Take the appropriate measures in preventing future weed growth which will give the transplants a good healthy chance of surviving. Once they are ready to be transplanted, dig a planting hole that is only a little larger than the root ball and roughly the same depth. Carefully place it into the hole and gently press the soil around it to help ensure there is a strong contact between the soil and the roots and don't forget to water it.

Cuttings Cuttings are also a popular alternative if you don't have the time to plant your favorite seed from scratch. There are numerous plants that will root easily from cuttings if done correctly and with proper care. If you are wondering how to root fig tree cuttings, for example, try and take the six to eight-inch cutting from a stem that is strong rather than a green stem which is more likely to rot. Ideally, take the cutting when the plant is dormant and put in a plastic pot that is filled with moistened soil. Cuttings, in general, should be anywhere from three to six inches long and made with a sharp cut as it is easier for shoots to develop into new roots if they are cut cleanly rather than mashed. Some choose to dip it into rooting hormone before putting it in the pot. Have patience with these cuttings as they may take a month or two before they take root.

Pruning Some plants, such as rose bushes, will need to be pruned regularly. This is done to both remove dead, diseased or damaged stems and prevent attracting insects or diseases from developing. The majority of plants will often be pruned right before it breaks dormancy and after the final frost in the spring, but there are some that may need to be pruned continuously throughout the year. Cutting roses back are done differently depending on what look you are aiming for. Light pruning involves thinning out less than a third of the plant which increases the number of short-stemmed flowers that appear. Moderate pruning involves five to twelve canes being cut 18-24 inches making for a larger bush and severe pruning leaves only three to four canes that are six to ten inches high and result in the fewest but largest blooms.



Urban Harvest Every February, my wife Mary and I visit the Urban Harvest Fruit Tree Sale to pick up some new trees to add to our yard. Due to COVID 19, Urban Harvest in 2021 will offer a week-long festival celebrating fruit trees from February 6 – 14, 2021. Texas Volunteer Deputy Voter Registrar – How to register voters for 2021/2022 elections.

In order to encourage voter registration, Texas election law provides for County Voter Registrars to designate individuals to assist in the registration of eligible persons to vote. These individuals are appointed as Volunteer Deputy Registrars and operate under State rules and the supervision of the County Voter Registrar. Once you have been trained and receive your certificate of appointment, you can help register voters for the next two years. Appointments end on Dec. 31st of even numbered years, so if you train in spring 20201, your appointment will last until Dec. 31, 2021. You can register voters on your own, or help an organization that conducts voter registration drives. There are rules to follow and those are explained in ZOOM classes offered by the Harris County Tax Assessor-Collector office. See info online at https://www.hctax.net/voter/Deputy

Zoom training classes offered by Harris County begin on Jan. 6, 2021, and continue throughout the year.

As we all saw in the just held national election, voting is right and a responsibility. Helping non-voters learn how to register to vote is a very rewarding volunteer activity.

To be eligible to serve as a Volunteer Deputy Voter Registrar, you MUST be: (1) at least 18 years of age; (2) a citizen of the United States; and (3) a resident of Texas. Plus, there are other rules that are fully explained on the website.




Ditch 136 (runs along UP railroad tracks) — report by Bob Weber

On Friday, Nov. 13, 2020 work began on re-grading the ditch between West Bellfort and Willowbend. This work should improve the drainage on Bassoon and Oboe but I suspect that this will adversely affect the turtle habitat * . I spoke with Melvin Hopkins in Councilperson Martha Castex-Tatum's office regarding the ditch and presently the plan is to only re-grade from West Bellfort to Willowbend. He said that there is a plan to "work" Ditch 136 from West Bellfort to the bayou (Brays Bayou) in April of 2021. Will keep everyone informed on the progress.

• Ditch 136 is home to lots of wildlife including turtles. Some Westwood residents even refer to Ditch 136 as Turtle Bayou. Hopefully after the re-grading the turtles will be able to continue to use the ditch for shelter and food.

Ditch 136 runs along the railroad tracks from Willowbend north to Brays Bayou. Some storm sewers in the south section of Westwood drain into Ditch 136. We want to keep the ditch clear of debris so Bassoon, Woodcraft, Woodfox, Woodfin, Woodhaven, Woodwind, Woodshire, Oboe and McDermed drain during heavy rains.

Something to think about when you gather, even in a small group, with people you are sure haven't been exposed to COVID 19. You just don't know how they have been exposed by virtue of their extended "safe" small groups being exposed.

testing. Closest site to Westwood is the Aramco Parking Lot at 9009 W. Loop South, across from Hobby Lobby and Lowe's.

Call City of Houston at 832-393-4220 for an access code, then drive through the test site. I was tested recently and it took about 12-15 minutes from arrival to leaving. Got results in less than 30 hours. Be sure to you give them a cell phone number for the results and keep the volume up so you hear the call when it comes. It's a great relief when they say you tested negative, but remember to keep away from groups for a week afterward anyway just to be safe. Paul Sobieski

Stay Positive and Test Negative!

As Texas surpasses the grim milestone of more than one million confirmed COVID-19 cases, the need for a COVID-19 vaccine in Texas has grown more dire by the day. Leading drug manufacturers including Pfizer, Moderna and AstraZeneca are offering three promising COVID-19 vaccines, and the first shots from Pfizer and Moderna could be given in the coming weeks.

Texas Medical Center can potentially have first shipments at the end of December or the beginning of the year, maybe sooner, according Houston's internationally renowned infectious disease expert, Baylor College of Medicine's Dr. Peter Hotez.

In an interview with the Houston Chronicle, Hotez revealed more about the current uptick in COVID-19 cases in Texas and the vaccine rollout.

Chron: What's driving the winter surge of COVID-19 cases throughout Texas? **Hotez:** There's a few things going on. Nationally, the colder weather is driving people indoors. North Dakota, Wyoming, Iowa, West Texas, Idaho, New Mexico are some of the worst-affected areas. People are indoors more, and they're more exposed. Also, there's the factor that the virus survives better in the colder weather. Out of the 12 most affected states, some of them are red states. Why that's relevant is that some local leaders, some governors buy into the White House coronavirus disinformation campaign that basically says that 'COVID-19 is a hoax.' They're discrediting masks. This is causing people to be defiant in many cases. It's really deadly. COVID-19 will soon be the leading cause of deaths on a daily basis in the U.S. It's just spiraled out of control at this point. An estimated 15,000 Texans will lose their lives between now and right after the inauguration. We're already the worst COVID-19 affected state in the country in terms of number of cases. None of them have to die. It's preventable.

Chron: There are three promising vaccines from drugmakers, Pfizer, Moderna and AstraZeneca. Which one shows the most promise for you and which would you choose when they become available?

I think we will have good vaccines very soon. The question I often get asked, 'Hey Dr. Hotez, which vaccine will you be taking?' We're not going to have a lot of choices in the very beginning. All of the vaccines work the same way. They all work by inducing the immune response to spiked protein of virus. Don't try to cherrypick or overthink it. Get whatever you can because they all work to give you that virusneutralizing antibodies that'll keep you out of the hospital. Later on, you can always get a booster. But don't wait. Take the first FDA-approved vaccine offered to you. The first one that's offered to me, I will take.

Nov. 21, 2020 Update on Bridges over Brays Bayou - by Bob Weber


Greenbriar Bridge. Work is complete and bridge is completely open.

<u>Stella Link Road Bridge</u>. Traffic is moving in all 4 lanes on Stella Link Bridge but work is ongoing under the bridge.

<u>Buffalo Speedway Bridge</u>. The current bridge will be demolished and replaced with a higher, longer, and wider bridge. The new bridge will be four lanes wide, include a left turn lane at each intersection, and have an expanded 10-foot sidewalk. Work is slated to begin in early 2021.

<u>Hillcroft Bridge</u>. The Hillcroft Bridge was raised 15 inches and the intersections of North and South Braeswood are complete. Traffic is moving in all lanes but some channel work is ongoing along with some cleanup.

<u>South Rice Bridge</u>. The South Rice Bridges will be demolished and a complete replacement with higher, longer and wider bridges. The plan is for segments of the bridges to remain open to commuter and pedestrian traffic during the construction period, with temporary lane closures to the North and Southbound lanes as the bridges are being reconstructed. Construction will begin winter of 2020/2021 and last about one year.

<u>Chimney Rock Road Bridge</u>. The Chimney Rock Road Bridges will be demolished and a complete replacement with higher, longer and wider bridges. The plan is for segments of the bridges to remain open to commuter and pedestrian traffic during the construction period, with temporary lane closures to the North and Southbound lanes as the bridges are being reconstructed. Construction will begin in the winter of 2020/2021 and is scheduled to last about one year.



New Homes and Homes Being Remodeled in Westwood.

Presently there are four new homes being built in Westwood. These houses are in varying stages of construction. Below is a brief description of the general location and status of construction as observed from the street for each house.

4002 Silverwood. This house on the corner of Stella Link Road and Silverwood has been under construction for some time. The foundation, framing, roof, siding and sheetrock installation has been completed. This house should be nearing completion soon.

4114 O'Meara. Near the intersection of O'Meara at Oboe. Foundation, framing, roof and siding are in place, and was recently painted.

4053 Woodfox. Between Stella Link Road and Woodwind. The foundation is finished and framing of the second story is in progress.

4117 Woodcraft. The foundation has been poured and framing is in progress. This will be a two story home.

Please remember that permits are needed for renovations as well as complete re-builds. The process is that you need to be cleared by the Westwood Architectural Review Committee and then by the City of Houston permitting office. In order to get a permit, someone has to sign an affidavit that states that the issuance of a permit does not authorize construction on, or use of, any property in violation of deed restrictions. Any misrepresentations on the affidavit will render the permit void. Please contact Ken Calvert of the Westwood Architectural Review Committee before beginning work to insure that are no Deed Restrictions are being violated. Offense

It shall be an offense for any person to park or to cause, suffer or permit the parking of a vehicle or equipment on any surface that is not an improved surface as defined in this article, within any front or side yard of a single-family residence in a residential area subject to this section. It is presumed that the registered owner of the vehicle or equipment is the person who parked, caused, suffered or permitted the vehicle or equipment to be parked in violation of this article.

Penalty

Any person who violates any provision of this article shall be guilty of a misdemeanor and, upon conviction thereof, shall be punished by a fine not to exceed \$150.00. Each day a violation of this article shall continue shall constitute a separate offense.




Wrap the Gifts and the Tree:





Have you ever driven past a barn with a quilt block pattern and wondered about the meaning behind it? Barn quilts began as a way to honor a loved one with a gorgeous piece of folk art. While barn quilts have been around for many years, there's been a spike in popularity in the last two decades. In Adams County, Ohio, in 2001, Donna Sue Groves set out to honor her mother, Maxine, and her quilt art by painting a quilt block on her tobacco barn. The idea was a hit, and soon friends and neighbors wanted barn quilts of their own. Donna realized that her unique quilting could have quite the effect on the area, so she decided to paint barns with quilt squares all over, and soon the first barn quilt trail was born.

So what is a quilt trail, you ask? Great question! According to <u>Barn Quilt Info</u>, it's a collection of quilt blocks on a barn or building or house that are on a walking or driving trail. The quilt patterns can be on the side of any buildings the quilter sees fit to put them on. The barn quilts are generally chosen from a family's own colorful <u>quilt</u> pattern that has been passed down through the years. Then the family's quilt pattern is turned into public art on their own barn or other building, and it becomes part of a quilt trail. However, anyone can make a barn quilt and can make their own pattern.

It would be wonderful to see houses all over Westwood decorated with a barn quilt and **have our own**Westwood trail. (There are barn quilts trails all over Texas. The largest is in Bonham northeast of Dallas with.)















How to make a DIY barn quilt. By Cindy at DIYBEAUTIFY.com

Choose or make up a pattern. There are lots

of ideas and pictures on the internet.:

- <u>pressure treated plywood</u> (cut to 4' square in store, or whatever size you choose to make your barn quilt)
- 2x4's to brace the back for hanging
- L-brackets
- outdoor <u>marine paint</u> in colors of choice (they'll tint it in-store for you)
- paint brushes and rollers in various sizes
- <u>painter's tape</u> (optional)
- measuring tape and pencil
- straight edge.:

Step 1 - Sand the board really well to make it ultra smooth and ready for paint.

Step 2 - Paint the board with two coats of white marine paint. We kept it extra simple with no borders.







Step 3 - Measure and mark the pattern with a ruler and a pencil. The Ohio Star pattern is made by dividing the board into thirds and drawing straight lines across, then connecting the corners with diagonal lines. And just like that, it looks like a star!

Step 4 - If you have a complicated pattern, you may want to tape the edges to make painting easier. Paint the star with a contrasting color. You can use a small roller brush for this part, but need something infinitely smaller to stay inside the lines in the corners and edges. Use a flat craft brush for those areas and then filled it in with a larger brush and the roller. Doesn't look great initially...it takes about 3-4 coats to really cover well. Remember, this quilt will be hanging on a building so you won't see any small mistakes or slightly uneven lines!







The painting definitely takes the longest because you need to wait for it to dry before painting another coat. Four coats later it looked a lot better! Marine paint is intended for wet conditions. If you choose to use another paint, you'll want to seal the painted barn quilt with several coats of <u>clear polycrylic sealant</u>. Stay away from polyurethane as it tends to yellow white paint!

How to hang a barn quilt - **S**crew the 2x4's to build a frame at the back of the quilt. Use L-brackets to secure them together. The frame gives the wood barn quilt stability so it won't warp in the changing weather. It also provides a frame to drill into and secure the barn quilt to the garage, rather than drilling into the quilt itself and messing up all of your hard work



You might consider painting a mural on a fence or garage wall! I did it on my garage wall overlooking our backyard gardens and it really makes the wall pop! E-mail me if you are interested in having a mural painted.

REPORT FROM SHEARN ELEMENTARY SCHOOL.



LESS FLOODING....MORE GREENSPACE

This is the motto of the Willow Waterhole Greenspace Conservancy, a non-profit organization which leads efforts to improve and maintain this 291 acre park. The conservancy assists and nurtures the partnership with residents, environmental groups, Harris County Flood Control District, Harris County Precinct One, Texas Parks and Wildlife Department, City of Houston Parks and Recreation Department and the Houston Parks Board in developing Willow Waterhole Greenway.

In 2002, Harris County Flood Control District began acquiring property to be used for flood control. Construction started in 2003. The last of the six wet bottom detention ponds was completed in 2019. All of the ponds are connected by underground box culverts which are connected to the Willow Waterhole Bayou, which drains into Brays Bayou just north of South Loop 610.

Today, the "lakes" range from 10 acres to 110 acres and can retain 600 million gallons of storm water. In 2016 Texas Parks and Wildlife began stocking the lakes with bass, sunfish and catfish. Fishing is encouraged along with canoeing and kayaking.

The Greenway has extensive walking and biking trails complimented with native trees, plants and grasses. While enjoying the trails you may notice numerous birds. The Houston Audubon Society conducts monthly bird surveys and has identified approximately 200 different species of birds in the Greenway.

Willow Waterhole Greenway is a place in our neighborhood that should be used, visited and supported. Parking is available at the main entrance at 5300 Dryad which is adjacent to Westbury High School and the Westbury Little League complex. There is street parking available on Ricecrest between S. Willow Drive and Gasmer.
